02 Qualifications

- You need to be aged between 16 39
- No qualifications are required for this role
- You must be a British or Dual National
- A Body Mass Index (BMI) between 18 and 28 (between 17 and 27 if under 18)
- You must pass the Naval Swimming Test

Training and development continues throughout your career with the Royal Navy. It takes place at onshore training facilities and on board operational ships. On joining, you complete 10 weeks basic naval training, followed by five - six months of specialist communication and IT systems training focussing on:

- Network engineering
- Specialist communication and IT equipment
- Conducting routine checks on communications equipment
- Sending and receiving information
- Essential tools and techniques
- Safety procedures

Aim to get yourself as fit as you can before you arrive. You'll be doing a lot of physical exercise, and you'll find it much easier if you're already in good shape. There's also a swimming test, so if you can't swim, make sure you've learned by the time you join us.

04 Skills for life

- Study for GCSEs, A-Levels, NVQs or a degree
- Gain specialist vocational qualifications as your career progresses

Training will be a constant feature of your time with us where you will you will become an expert in managing abd maintaining networks and other state of the art communication equipment. We'll help you gain academic qualifications like GCSEs, A-levels, even a degree should you wish. You will be enrolled on an Apprenticeship scheme and gain vocational qualifications as you progress.
