Training and development continues throughout your career with the Royal Navy. It takes place at onshore training facilities and onboard operational ships. On joining, you'll complete 10 weeks of Basic Training at HMS Raleigh, where you'll gain skills that will stay with you throughout your career. During week 8 or 9 you will be streamed either AWT, AWW, EW or UW. After that, you'll go on to complete three months of specialist training at the Maritime Warfare School, focussing on:

- Setting up and operating systems that monitor the surface and air space
- Gaining information about flight paths, landmarks and shorelines
- · Learning to detect and report radio jamming
- Using radio circuits to pass vital information
- · Gaining hands-on experience of life on board a warship

04 Skills for life

- Study for GCSEs, A-Levels, NVQs or a degree
- Gain specialist vocational qualifications as your career progresses

Training will be a constant feature of your time with us. We'll help you gain academic qualifications like GCSEs, A-levels, even a degree. You can also work towards NVQs and other vocational awards.
